REPORT ON THE ANNUAL POLICE PLAN FOR THE YEAR 2017-18.

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Under the Annual Police Plan 2017-18 the following priorities were listed for implementation:

- 1. Prevention & Control of Crime.**
- 2. Time frame fixed for disposal of complaints.**
- 3. Disposal of cases within time frame.**
- 4. Management of Traffic.**
- 5. Improving Service Delivery.**
- 6. Human Resource Development.**
- 7. Adoption of new technologies and innovative methods in Policing.**
- 8. Implementation of Community Policing Schemes.**
- 9. Discipline and Vigilance.**
- 10. Improving Security Environment in the State.**
- 11. Welfare, Sports and Health of Policemen.**
- 12. Modernization of HP Police.**
- 13. Performance evaluation and accountability at Police Station, Sub-Division, District and Range level.**

The above mentioned priorities were implemented with effect from 1st April 2017 to 31st March 2018, and the progress made under each priority is being mentioned hereunder:

(1) Prevention & Control of Crime:

It was emphasized to adopt professional approach for investigation of cases especially under heads theft and burglary and to ensure effective service of non-bailable warrants for dispensation of justice.

Zero tolerance for ragging in colleges and professional institutions is being observed. Victims/Complainants Day is also being observed regularly in all Police Stations on 3rd Sunday of every month. Provisions of reception of visitors/complainants have been made available in Police Stations and complaints/FIRs are being recorded promptly.

Financial Investigation of all cases registered under ND&PS Act especially related to Drug Trafficking and repeat of offence is being initiated by all Investigation officers who are investigating ND&PS cases registered in their jurisdiction in the State of H.P.

Analysis of Satellite Map provided by ALDRIN in the field to see the veracity of Satellite images at ground level about its genuineness is being carried out by the concerned district SsP within their jurisdiction.

The reason for acquittal of ND&PS cases are being analyzed.

The information regarding illegal cultivation of Poppy crop is collected by concerned district SOs, in their respective jurisdiction along with the name of land owner and location name and area in bighas.

Identification of illegal cultivation of Cannabis crop by concerned District SsP is being done in their respective jurisdiction along with the name of land owner, location name and area in bighas.

The seized contrabands under ND&PS in which final verdicts have been given and no appeal lies in any court of Law are being destructed.

The target for investigation of ND&PS per Investigating Officer at least 07 cases during the year has been fixed.

Special campaigns are being launched for destruction of illicit cultivation of poppy and cannabis in every year from April to October with the help of Revenue department, Forest department and local bodies.

Awareness campaigns are being launched in H.P. by Narcotic cell as well as field units of CID to aware general public and school/college students regarding ill effects of drugs.

Exhibitions and awareness campaign organized in Kullu Dusshera to educate general public against the ill effect of drug abuse. Pamphlets, booklets and posters were distributed related to drug abuse.

26th June of each year is being observed as “International Day against Drug abuse and illicit trafficking”. On this day every year Narcotic Cell and district police have organized various activities i.e. display of banner and posters at all prominent public places, broadcast of drug awareness messages and programmers on local TV channels. Run against drug abuse organized at Shimla.

Special drives launched against uprooting the cannabis plants in H.P. by Narcotic Cell and district Police time to time.

As per provisions laid down in section 63(3) of Juvenile Justice Act, 2000 and in compliance to the orders passed by the Hon’ble Supreme Court of India in writ petition (Civil) No. 51/2006 and 75/2012 titled as “Bachpan Bachao Andolan” versus Union of India and others, Special Juvenile Police Units at police station in Himachal Pradesh have been established to handle the cases of juvenile.

Special Juvenile Police Units consists Addl. Station House Officer of the police station, one Lady Constable and one Constable of that Police Station. The Station House Officer of the concerned Police Station have been designated as Child Welfare Officer.

(4) Management of Traffic:

It was clearly laid down that the objective of Better Traffic Management is to ensure smooth and safe flow of pedestrian and vehicular traffic on National/State highways and district/municipal roads and to ensure zero tolerance towards drunken driving, over speeding, rash and negligent driving, use of mobile phones and playing loud music while driving.

(x) Publicity campaigns against dangerous/drunken driving and using mobile while driving.

Wide publicity through Police and Print Media and phone in live programme to educate general public and the owners/drivers of the vehicles about traffic infringements has been made.

(xi) To prepare data base of road traffic accidents in the state, Road Accident Data Management System has been introduced in the state and started working throughout the state w.e.f. 01.01.2016. The data of road traffic accidents is being monitored/analyzed by ADMC at Police Headquarter. In future it will be very useful to identify the places where accidents are occurred repeatedly.

(xii) Identification of black spot is being done as per the standard uniform definition and format for data collection of black spot prepared and notified by the MoRTH. Till now 127 accidents black spot have been identified and the list of 127 black spots so identified had been sent to Engineer-in-Chief PWD for rectification.

(xiii) Traffic Education Programmes: The TTR teams distributed Road Safety awareness material and AIG/TTR organized & addressed meetings with stake holders viz. Bus/Truck operators, Taxi operators/drivers, School children, members of road safety and other motorist at different places throughout the state. During the meeting, the participants were educated on road safety and drug abuse/illicit trafficking in the state.

(5) Improving Service Delivery:

(a) 100% implementation of time frame for service delivery notified under Right to Services Act is being ensured at every level. The complaints received through SMS service are being responded within 10 minutes after the receipt of SMS by the concerned SHO. Gazetted Officers are visiting in Police Stations during Complainants Day being observed on every 3rd Sunday of the month and maximum publicity through local television network and other media are being made. GOs are also interacting with complainants on sample basis to ascertain whether they have any complaints regarding functioning of the police.

- (b) 100% non-bailable warrants received should be promptly executed= 69.05%
- (c) Quick disposal of verifications of Passport and Service verifications:-
 - Passport applications=93.25%
 - Service Verifications=91.67%

(6) Human Resource Development:

- (a) **100% compliance of targets of training courses.**

(7) Adoption of new technologies and innovative methods in Policing:

In order to facilitate scientific investigation of cases, investigation kits have been provided to all Police Stations. To achieve objectives, 12059 times Alco sensors and 8935 times Doppler Radars have been used during the campaigns launched to check traffic violations. During the year, 965 cases have been registered under NDPS Act and NDPS Kit used in 686 cases. 15977 cases registered under other heads and investigation kits are used in 6271 cases.

Police SMS service for general public has been started in the State from 05.05.2010. Under this scheme, anyone can seek police assistance by sending an SMS to the helpline No. 9459100100. During the period 1066 SMS have been received out of which 956 SMS have been disposed off and 110 SMS under progress.

100 numbers of telephone recorders have been provided to all Police Stations in the State.

Computer labs have been established at each District Headquarter in the State. Besides this, one lab has been established at CID HP Shimla.

Handy cams and digital/video cameras have been provided to all Police Stations for recording crime scene, raids, searches and law & order situations etc.

Two CID Police Stations and one Cyber Police Station have been established at Shimla to curb the illicit financial arms flow. The jurisdiction of the Police Station is all over State.

Eight Women Police Stations have been established in Shimla, Mandi, D/Shala Baddi, Kullu, Una, Bilaspur and Sirmour to investigate the crime against women. The Women

Police Stations will be opened in remaining Solan, Hamirpur and Chamba districts. The proposal for women police station will be opened in remaining Solan, Hamirpur and Chamba districts has been sent to the Govt. of HP for consideration.

Four Anti-Human trafficking Units in Shimla, Kangra, Sirmour and Kullu districts have been established. In order to deal with the crimes against children, Special Juvenile Police Units have been established in all Police Stations.

SC/ST Cell has been established at headquarter level to monitor the violence against women and people of ST/SC community.

In order that women officers should investigate the crime related to women, special women's cells have been established in all the Districts, which are manned by lady investigating officers. The underlying philosophy is that the victims of woman-related crimes can express themselves freely without hesitation to the women officers as compared to their male counterparts.

In order to instill a sense of confidence among victim women and to encourage them to unhesitatingly express their grievances in the Police Stations, 2 to 3 women Police officials have been posted in each Police Station of this State.

(8) Implementation of Community Policing Schemes:

In order to help prevent crime, reduce fear of crime and ensure safety and security of the community and encourage peoples' participation in policing, the following Community Policing Schemes have been implemented in 2017-18:-

At the Beat Level:

BEAT POLICING TEAM: Beat Policing Team (Active Group): This scheme has been initiated with the help of active group of six/seven respectable citizens of the area, one HHG, one Chowkidar and one Police Officer (beat constable). One private member of this group is the team leader (Honorary Special Police Officer).

SANRAKSHAN YOJNA: Senior citizens who are above sixty five years of age and are living alone have been identified and they are being contacted regularly to enquire about their welfare and to render reasonable assistance.

POLICE SAHAYATA KAKSH: To instill sense of safety and security in the minds of general public and tourists Police Sahayata Kaksh/Police Assistance Centers have been established at important places in the beat to help and assist residents/visitors.

SAMUDAYAK POLICE SAMITI: Community Policing Committees have been established in all Police Stations. These committees hold meetings to review functioning of police at Police Station level.

VISHWAS YOJNA: In order to create confidence in the people and to reduce perception gap between the local Police Station staff and local community about functioning of Police Stations, public groups and school children visit local Police Stations.

(9) Discipline and Vigilance:

Monday Parade and Orderly Rooms are held regularly as per provisions laid down in H.P. Police Act, 2007.

66 Departmental Enquiries were pending as on 31.03.2017 and during the period 01.04.2017 to 31.03.2018, 97 Departmental Enquiries have been initiated against the police personnel, out of which 87 DEs have been finalized within stipulated period of 24 weeks & 04 DEs finalized after stipulated period and 72 DEs are lying pending.

During the period 67 complaints against G.Os were received out of which 58 complaints have been disposed off and 09 complaints are lying pending. Similarly 134 complaints against NGOs Grade-I & II were received out of which 105 complaints have been disposed off and 29 complaints are lying pending.

(10) Improving Security Environment in the State:

During the period technology for security of temples has been upgraded. CCTV in 285 temples, burglar alarm in 17 temples, fencing in 269 temples and Flood Lights in 260 temples have been installed. Sentries and chowkidars have been deployed in many temples. In addition, adequate police force is being deployed in peak season at important temples.

There are 649 vital installations in the state, the security arrangements of these vital installations is being reviewed time to time. 1066 NGOs Grade-I & II and Home Guards have been deployed at tourist places.

During the period, 88 inter-state border meetings at SHO level, 58 at SDPO level, 23 at S.P level and 01 IGP level have been held. Patrolling and beat system have been reviewed and strengthened in urban and rural areas. 0 surprises checking of night patrolling by IGP Ranges, 664 by Ss.P, 732 by ASsP/Addl. Ss.P and 3568 by Dy. Ss.P have been done.

(11) Welfare, Sports and Health of Policemen:

To carry forward the work of welfare of policemen and to promote sports culture in H.P. Police in a more efficient and effective manner the HP Police Sports Control Board is already functioning at the State level under the Chairmanship of DGP/HP, and the Central Police Welfare Committee also stands constituted as per the new HP Police Act, 2007.

During the period 235 JCC meetings were held at Districts/Units Level, 37 meetings at Range Level, 01 meeting at DGP Level and no meeting at Chief Minister Level.

Financial Assistance of Rs. 11,17,000/- was granted to 64 eligible wards of police personnel.

Welfare loan amounting to Rs. 18,42,000/- was granted to eligible 21 GOs.

An amount of Rs. 2,48,863/- as Red Cross contribution by conducting various events in the Red Cross Mela & sales of Red Cross Flags, sale of coupons has been provided to H.P. Red Cross Society.

During the year 2017-18, matching grant of Rs. 10.00 lacs against our demand Rs. 30.00 lacs have been provided by the Government.

During the year 2017-18, amount of Rs. 13,56,257/- have been provided to needy districts/units on 50:50 basis and Rs. 1,80,000/- provided on 100% basis out of Central Welfare Funds for the purchase of plastic furniture and other essential items for furnishing and upgrading of Kitchen facilities etc.

Bi-monthly State welfare fund committee meetings are being held regularly.

The Van Mahotsav was celebrated at PHQ as well as all District/Unit level in the month of July, 2017 by the Police Department. During Van Mahotsav, 800 numbers of plantations were made in Police complex/at the various sites.

Police Welfare Week for the welfare of police personnel and their families is being celebrated every year in the month of October. The welfare week during the year 2017 was celebrated in which various meetings were held with Pradhans Gram Panchyats and Villagers on the issue of Community Policing, Smarth Yojna and Vishwas Yojna etc.

Medical Check-up of 95.35% of Police personnel to the rank of Constable to Inspectors have carried out during the year.

Police Housing:

During the financial year 2017-18, the State Govt. has provided a sum of Rs. 4101.24 lac for the construction of “Police Housing” under which 115 works residential/non-residential buildings are being constructed.

In view of above, there is also a budget provision of Rs. 754.01 lac for repairs and maintenance of Police Buildings during the last financial year 2017-18.

Modernization of HP Police:

Under the Scheme of Modernization of State Police Force for the year 2005-06 to 2016-17, the Central & State Govt. have contributed towards the scheme proportionately @ 75%:25% w.e.f. 2005-06 to 2011-12, 60%:40% w.e.f. 2012-13 to 2015-16 and the funding pattern from 2016-17 has been changed to 90%:10%. The scheme was fully under Non Plan upto 2011-12 and from 2012-13, it has been divided into two parts i.e. Plan for construction works and Non Plan for weaponry, mobility and equipments. The scheme has been included in the Core Schemes of Niti Aayog of Govt. of India w.e.f. 2016-17. From the year 2017-18, the scheme has been renamed as Assistance to states for modernization of Police Force” with the funding criteria

of 90%. The components of vehicles and construction have been deleted to the states and funding under mobility and construction would be given to J&K, insurgency affected areas of ME and left wing Extremism (LWE) area.
