# HIMACHAL PRADESH POLICE DEPARTMENT SHIMLA

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**REPORT ON THE ANNUAL POLICE PLAN  
FOR THE YEAR 2019-20.**

Under the Annual Police Plan 2019-20, the following priorities were listed for implementation:

1. Prevention & control of crime.
2. Management of traffic.
3. Improving service delivery.
4. Time frame fixed for disposal of complaints.
5. Disposal of cases within time frame.
6. Human resource development.
7. Adoption of new technologies and innovative methods in Policing.
8. Implementation of community policing schemes.
9. Discipline and vigilance.
10. Improving security environment in the state.
11. Welfare, sports and health of policemen.
12. Performance evaluation and accountability at Police Station, Sub-Division, District and Range level.

The above mentioned priorities were implemented with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2019 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020, and the progress made under each priority is being mentioned hereunder:

**(1) Prevention & control of crime:**

It was emphasized to adopt professional approach for investigation of cases especially under heads theft and burglary and to ensure effective service of non-bailable warrants for dispensation of justice.

Zero tolerance against ragging in colleges and professional institutions is being observed. Victims/complainants day is also being observed regularly at all Police Stations on 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of every month. Provisions of reception of visitors/complainants have been made in Police Stations and complaints/FIRs are being recorded promptly.

Financial investigation of all cases registered under ND&PS Act especially related to drug trafficking and repeat offences is being initiated by all investigation officers of the ND&PS cases registered in their jurisdiction in the State.

The reasons for acquittal in ND&PS cases are being analyzed. The information regarding illegal cultivation of poppy and cannabis crops is collected by concerned district SOs, for their respective jurisdictions with details of land owner, location and area in bighas.

The seized contrabands under ND&PS in which final verdicts have been given and no appeal lies in any court of law are being destroyed as per procedure.

Annual special campaigns are launched for destruction of illicit cultivation of poppy and cannabis by the Narcotics Cell and district Police in coordination with revenue & forest departments and concerned local bodies.

Awareness campaigns are launched by narcotic cell as well as field units of CID to educate general public and school/college students on ill effects of drugs abuse.

The Joint Task Force was created after Hon'ble CM made announcement to this effect during budget session has been constituted on 26.02.2019. It is headed by IGP (Intelligence) CID and consists of Zonal Director, NCB Chandigarh, State Drug Controller, HP Baddi and Superintendent of Police, SNCC/CID Shimla.

**Drug Free Himachal mobile application:** A mobile phone application "Drug Free Himachal" has been launched by Himachal Pradesh Police. This application has been devised to control illicit trafficking, sale and use of narcotics substances in the State. People can

give information on this App. Necessary direction has been given to all field functionaries to aware general public regarding this App.

A toll free Nasha Nivaran helpline No. "1908" was launched by Hon'ble Chief Minister of Himachal Pradesh on 30.06.2019. The main objective of this helpline is to encourage general public to share information on drug traffickers and peddlers without revealing their identity, and also to provide counseling to drug users, their parents and all information on de addiction. People can call on this line without revealing their identity.

## **(2) Management of traffic:**

It has been clearly defined that the objective of better traffic management is to ensure smooth and safe flow of pedestrian and vehicular traffic on National/State highways and district/municipal roads and to ensure zero tolerance towards drunken driving, over speeding, rash and negligent driving, use of mobile phones and playing loud music while driving. Accordingly the targets set and achieved are as under:-

Special campaigns were conducted against dangerous/drunken driving and for using mobile while driving. General public and owners/drivers of the vehicles were educated on traffic infringements through print and social media.

To prepare data base on road traffic accidents in the State, Road Accident Data Management System (RADMS) has been introduced w.e.f. 01.01.2016. The data of road traffic accidents is being monitored/analyzed through Accident Data Management Center (ADMC) at Police Headquarter.



TTR teams distributed road safety awareness material and AIG/TTR organized & addressed meetings with stake holders viz. bus/truck operators, taxi operators/drivers, school children, members of road safety and other motorist at different places throughout the state. During the meeting, the participants were educated on road safety and drug abuse/illicit trafficking in the state.

### (3) **Improving Service Delivery:**

(a&c) 100% implementation of time frame for service delivery notified under Right to Services Act is being ensured at every level. The complaints received through SMS service are being responded within 10 minutes after the receipt of SMS by the concerned SHO. Gazetted Officers are visiting Police Stations on Complainants Day which is being observed on every 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of the month. GOs are also interacting with complainants on in regular basis to ascertain if they have any complaint regarding functioning of the police.

**(7) Adoption of new technologies and innovative methods in Policing:**

In order to facilitate scientific investigation of cases, investigation kits have been provided to all Police Stations. During the year, 1604 cases have been registered under NDPS Act and NDPS Kits were used in 1244 cases. 18340 cases were registered under other heads and investigation kits were used in 5968 cases.

Himachal Pradesh has provided special facilities to women to come forward and register cases through Suvidha yojna, free registration, online complaints and online FIR registration. Police Department has initiated many steps in the recent years to ensure better police response to the issue. A Women and Child support cum-Anti Human Trafficking Unit has been constituted at State CID Hdqrs., Shimla to monitor as well as to ensure quick disposal of cases of crime against women. No particular area is prone to the incidence of such crime in this state. No special organized gang is operative in the state to commit crime against women. In a nutshell, a complete sense of security is prevailing among women folk and they are performing their daily chores without any fear. The following steps have been taken by the Himachal Pradesh Police for the security of women.

- (i) 100 numbers of telephone recorders have been provided to Police Stations in the State.
- (ii) Facility of filing complaints through SMS is available on phone No. 94591-00100 all 24 hours.
- (iii) One CID Police Station and one Cyber Police Station have been established at Shimla to deal with related crimes. The jurisdiction of these Police Station is all over State. Besides this, one lab has also been established at CID HP Shimla.



- (iv) 11 Women Police Stations have been established in all the districts except Kinnaur & L&S to investigate crime against women.
- (v) Four Anti-Human Trafficking Units have been established in Shimla, Kangra, Sirmour and Kullu districts. To deal with the crimes against children, Special Juvenile Police Units have been established in all Police Stations. However, the Anti Human Trafficking Units are being established in remaining districts.
- (vi) SC/ST Cell has been established at headquarter level to monitor violence against people of ST/SC community.
- (vii) Handy cams and digital/video cameras have been provided to all Police Stations for recording crime scene, raids, searches and law & order situations etc.
- (viii) In order to instill a sense of confidence among victim women and to encourage them to unhesitatingly express their grievances at Police Stations, women police officials have been posted in each Police Station of the State.
- (ix) The new schemes i.e. Gudiya Helpline-1515, Hoshiyar Singh Helpline-1090 and Shakti Button App have been launched in the State. 4035 complaints were received through Gudiya Helpline out of which 3985 have been disposed off, 2637 complaints were received through Hoshiyar Singh Helpline out of which 2628 complaints have been disposed off and 3638 complaints were received through Shakti Button App w.e.f. 26.01.2018 to 24.06.2020 which have been disposed off.

#### **(8) Implementation of Community Policing Schemes:**

In order to help prevent crime, reduce fear of crime and ensure safety and security of the community and encourage peoples' participation in policing, the following Community Policing Schemes have been implemented:-

- (a) SANRAKSHAN YOJNA:** Senior citizens who are above sixty five years of age and are living alone have been identified and they are being contacted regularly to enquire about their welfare and to render reasonable assistance.

- (b) SAMUDAYAK POLICE SAMITI:** Community Policing Committees have been established in all Police Stations. These committees hold meetings to review functioning of police at Police Station level.

**(c) VISHWAS YOJNA:** In order to create confidence in the people and to reduce perception gap between the local Police Station staff and local community about functioning of Police Stations, public groups and school children visit local Police Stations.

**POLICE CLUBS:** In order to garner help in implementation of social legislation, enforce duties of citizens as provided in the constitution, and to organize sports activities for police personnel, their families and the community, meetings of following clubs were held:

**(d) SAMARTH YOJNA:** Under this scheme girl students of schools and colleges in the State are imparted training in unarmed combat by police personnel in order to instill in them confidence while dealing with eve-teasers and other anti-social elements.

**(e) Student Police Cadet Scheme:** Scheme is being implemented.

**(9) Discipline and Vigilance:**

Monday Parade and Orderly Rooms are being held regularly as per provisions laid down in H.P. Police Act, 2007.

During the period, 60 Departmental Enquiries have been initiated against the police personnel, out of which 09 DEs have been finalized within stipulated period & 05 DEs finalized after stipulated period and 46 DEs are pending.



During the period, 615 complaints were received out of which 356 complaints have been disposed off within stipulated period & 225 complaints have been disposed off after stipulated period and 34 complaints are still pending.

**(10) Improving Security Environment in the State:**

Technology based security of temples has been upgraded. CCTV Cameras in 216 temples, burglar alarms in 98 temples, fencing in 209 temples and flood lights in 266 temples have been installed. Sentries and chowkidars have been deployed in many temples. In addition, adequate police force is being deployed at important temples on need basis.

There are 753 vital installations in the State. The security arrangements of these vital installations is being reviewed regularly. 366 NGOs Grade-I & II and home guards have been deployed at tourist places.

121 inter-state border meetings at SHO level, 86 at SDPO level, 41 at S.P level and 05 at IGP/DIGP level were held. Patrolling and beat system have been reviewed and strengthened in urban and rural areas. 02 surprise checkings of night patrolling by IGP/DIG Ranges, 703 by SP, 979 by ASP/Addl.S.P and 3761 by Dy.S.P have been done.

**(11) Welfare, Sports and Health of Policemen:**

To carry forward the work of welfare of policemen, the Central Police Welfare Committee also stands constituted as per HP Police Act, 2007. To promote sports culture in H.P. Police in a more efficient and effective manner, the HP Police Sports Control Board is already functioning at the State level under the Chairmanship of DGP/HP.

During the year 2019-20, funds have been provided to districts/units on 50:50 basis from Central Welfare Funds for purchase of plastic furniture, furnishings, upgradation of kitchens etc.

Nineteen Central Police Subsidiary Canteens have been opened in the Police Headquarters, PTC Daroh, Kangra, Bilaspur, Hamirpur, Kullu, Mandi, Lahaul & Spiti, Una, Chamba, Solan, Baddi, Sirmour, Kinnaur, 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> IRBns during the financial year 2018-19. Besides this, the opening of canteen in the 6<sup>th</sup> IRBn is under process.

Medical check-ups were carried for 96.56% of police personnel of the ranks of constable to inspectors.

Residential/non-residential buildings and repairs/maintenance of Police Buildings are being carried under Police Housing.

**Performance, evaluation and accountability at Police Station, Sub-Division, District and Range level:**

The performance and accountability of police is regularly assessed through crime meetings. 2605 crime meetings were held at Police Station level, 962 crime meetings at Sub-Division Level and 06 crime meetings at Range Level.
